"Now learn a parable of the fig tree; When his branch is yet tender, and putteth forth leaves, ye know summer is nigh: So likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know it is near, even at the doors.

Matthew 24:32-33

Just because this is a parable is no reason to think the answer to it has to be grand or something complicated. Jesus used parables to hide His language from some. Yet He promised to give understanding to those within. When speaking His children among the Jews, Jesus likens His truths to something the people can identify with. In this case, as with other parables, Jesus refers to farming, or growing and caring for crops. Remember the parable of the sower, the tares among the wheat, and the vineyard and its husbandmen to name a few. Here our Lord takes advantage of another occasion to set forth a parable which His children could identify with. It is only when we can not identify with something that it becomes complicated if we try to discern it. This is what Hal Lindsey does. He is well known for quoting the above verse. He says it means that Israel would become a nation again in 1948. How convenient for him to say this years after 1948 has passed. The idea Mr. Lindsey propagates here is utter hogwash.
